ASIA MADE EASY

Exploring Asia can be a logistical ordeal, especially if you want to see isolated parts of Mongolia or obscure Indonesian islands. But everything is effortless with REMOTE LANDS, a new U.S.-based firm specializing in custom private-jet trips in Asia. Its two founders, entrepreneurs Catherine Heald and Jay Tindall, have lived and traveled extensively in the region, developing the contacts needed for access to unique experiences, like spending a night with camel breeders in the Gobi desert or dining with the Queen of Bhutan. When Alyssa Duncan, an engineer from Kansas, went to India for the first time this year, Heald contacted her friends in Darieeling, the Maharaja Kumar of Barddhaman and his wife, and arranged a home stay for her. "They live in a palace, and their previous guests include the Aga Khan," says Duncan. "They treated me like family and hosted huge dinner parties every evening." Remote Lands can meet almost any request, such as hiring a chef and a personal trainer to go along. It also offers group itineraries focused on specific interests—among them golf and architecture—and led by experts in those fields. The next one is the Cuisine & Culture trip (October 13-26), during which food writer Gael Greene and author and Asia hand Simon Winchester will put flavors and sites in context on a journey through Thailand, Myanmar, India, China and Bhutan (double occupancy \$49,950 per person, including round-trip airfare from Los Angeles to Bangkok). Best of all, the company donates 5 percent of profits to sustainabletourism projects in the destinations its clients visit.
