

FOOD: PASS THE PORK

Best known for the perennially packed Spotted Pig, and more recently the seafood restaurant John Dory, chef April Bloomfield has set her sights on a third New York City venture: the 168-seat gastropub Breslin (16 W. 29th St.; 646/214-5788; dinner for two \$64), debuting next month. Housed on the ground floor of the new Ace Hotel and designed by New York-based architects Roman & Williams, the dining room is reminiscent of an early-20th-century saloon, with a vintage mahogany bar and green leather banquettes. Bloomfield's menu is all about the pig-from snout to tail. Her favorite dish? "The pork terrine. What more could you want?" -NATHALIE JORDI

RESORTS: SOUTHEAST ASIA

NEW CROP OF AFFORDABLE BOUTIQUE HOTELS IS COMING TO SOME OF Southeast Asia's less traveled shores. Just 50 miles east of Singapore is **Nikoi Island** (65/9635-1950; nikoi.com; beach houses from \$190), a 37-acre private isle off the coast of Bintan fringed by powdery white-sand beaches. Its 10 Indonesian-inspired bungalows are constructed from driftwood and outfitted with built-in daybeds, stone-floored

bathrooms, and thatch roofs. On Siargao Island, in the southeast corner of the Philippines, two Paris transplants recently opened Kalinaw Resort (General Luna, Siargao Island; 63/921-320-0442; kalinawresort.com; villas from \$130), a haven for surfers and Manila urbanites. The property's five airy beachfront cottages have dark doyok-doyok—wood floors and small balconies with rattan hammocks. Not far from the coast of Malaysian Borneo you'll find Bunga Raya Island Resort (Polish Bay, Pulau Gaya; 60-88/380-390; bungarayaresort.com; doubles from \$600, including meals and speedboat transfers), a secluded jungle hideaway that includes 56 timbered villas—some with private plunge pools—set in a lush rain forest. The 32 villas at Thailand's Seven Seas Resort (221 Moo 2 Koh Kradan; 66-75/2033-8990; sevenseasresorts.com; villas from \$188), a two-hour drive from Krabi, have open-air rain showers and terraces, many of which look out over the Andaman Sea.—Jennifer Chen
